For the last two years, we walked together — but separately — as we organized virtual walks throughout the community during one week in late September.

ACTON PARK IMPROVEMENTS SET TO BEGIN

The Town of Halton Hills will begin its Rennie Street Park improvements this month.

The revamped Acton park will include an obstacle/challenge focused play area and a multi-court area. The changes and new features were elements identified through public consultation.

Also included in the plan are:

- improved landscaping
- a range of play elements for children, youth, adults and se-
- · additional trees to provide shade
- · a pathway connection to the Rennie Woodlot Trail
 - seating and rest areas

The existing playground area and soccer field will remain.

Rennie Park is located off Tanners Drive at the corner of Rennie and Nelles streets. The work is expected to be completed in the spring of 2023.
