COMMON QUESTIONS ABOUTTINNITUS - PART 1 WHAT IS IT?

Tinnitus is a subjective experience where one hears a sound, ringing or noise when no external physical sound is present. Some call it "head noises", "ear ringing," or other similar things.

WHAT CAUSES IT?

There are many causes; indeed almost everything that can go wrong with the ear has Tinnitus associated with it as a symptom. Things as simple as wax against the eardrum to very serious items such as tumors on the 7th facial nerve can produce Tinnitus. Meniere's disease has Tinnitus associated with it. One of the most common causes of Tinnitus is exposure to excessively loud sounds such as shooting, chain saws, rock concerts, or other loud noises.

APPLICATIONS BEING ACCEPTED FOR COMMUNITY **INVESTMENT FUNDING**

Community organizations can now submit applications to the Halton Region Community Investment Fund for 2023 funding.

The HRCIF supports nonprofit human service programs and initiatives that enhance the health, safety and well-being of Halton res-

Funding is available in single year and multi-year grants through two catego-

Category One: Provides up to one year of funding, for a maximum of \$30,000. Nonprofit, charitable or unincorporated community or-

ganizations can apply to fund short-term, small capital and/or innovative projects.

Category Two: Provides up to three years of funding to registered charities for programs and initiatives.

Organizations that meet eligibility criteria may submit one application in each funding category. The initial application deadline for both categories is Tuesday, Nov. 1, 2022 at 2 p.m. Additional opportunities to apply for HRCIF funding will be available in 2023 for programs and initiatives that help respond to emerging community needs.

A virtual information session will be held for community organizations looking to learn more about the HRCIF and the application process on Tuesday, Oct. 4 from 6 to 8 p.m.
