FAMILIES IN STATE OF EMERGENCY. LEARNING FOUNDATION SAYS

With the price of food and other necessities rising beyond many people's ability to afford them, the Halton Learning Foundation (HLF) is sounding the alarm on students who need some financial support this winter.

Since the beginning of September, HLF has provided emergency financial support for a record number of students of the Halton District School Board (HDSB) — 30 per cent more than last year at this time — and the charity's busiest weeks still lie ahead.

"We need ongoing funding to continue to support kids' basic needs for food,

winter clothing and school supplies, and to help ensure all students are included in learning opportunities," said Lesley Mansfield, CEO of HLF.

"Every day we hear from teachers and principals about families who are barely getting by this fall. Parents' financial struggles can have a direct impact on students' ability to learn — whether it's due to a lack of nutrition, a lack of technology to complete school work, or perhaps because they need prescription glasses that the parents can't afford.'

HLF takes requests from educators in the HDSB on behalf of students in need. Teachers and principals are sharing that many more families this year are spending a disproportionate amount of their income on housing and utilities, leaving little left for food, clothing, school supplies and other necessities.

One man, recently immigrated with his family from South America, shared with HLF that 85 per cent of his salary is used to pay rent and utili-

"We are participating in some food banks and church to get food and other supplies," he said. "Unfortunately (it) is not enough. Two of my children have nutrition problems."

This season, HLF is asking the community to consider making a No Student Left Behind gift to help a

student in need in our community. Donations in tribute to a favourite teacher, friend or family member are welcomed and an ecard may be sent to the recipient to let them know about the generous gift made in their name.

"We believe that if we improve the health and well-being of students, they will do better in school," said Mansfield. "If kids do better in school, it can lead them to a better future."
