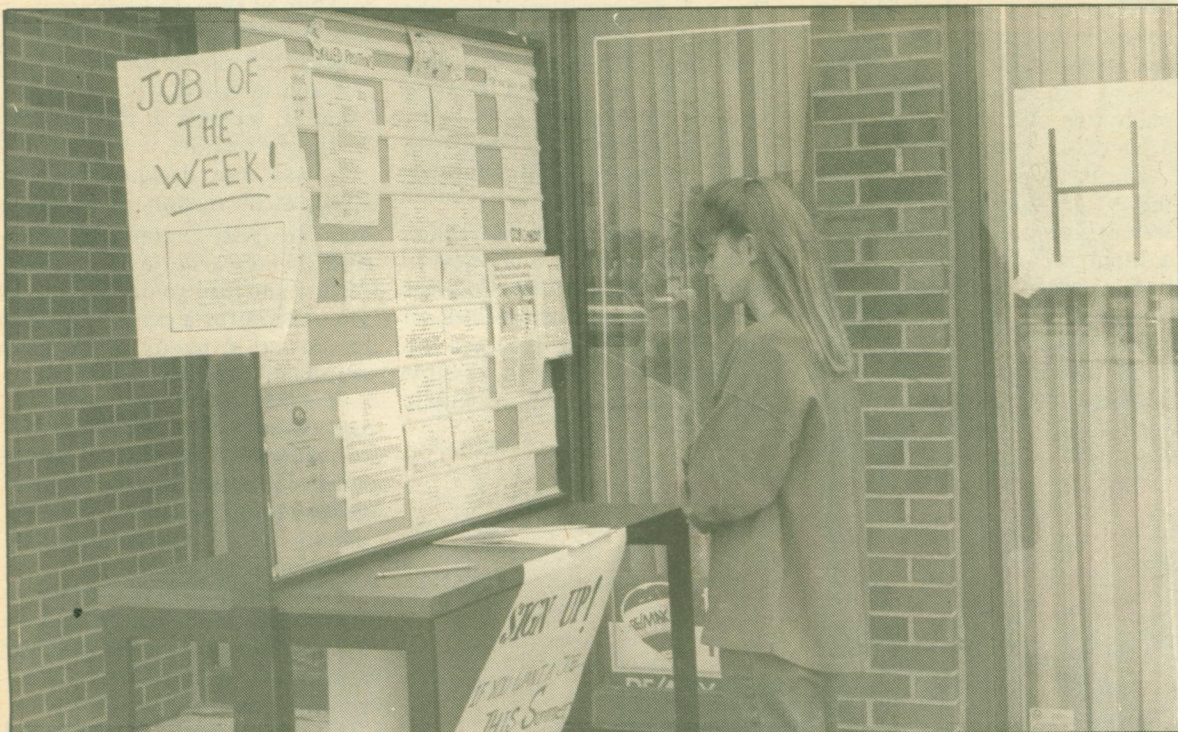


# Student jobs hard to find

The Canada Employment Centre for Students in Georgetown held their Hire-A-Student-Day, attracting students and employers to check out the centre's job board in hopes of landing a source of employment for the remainder of the summer, Friday.

Area businesses chipped in to give the centre a hand by advertising the event on store front marquees.

Nobody has to tell high school and post-secondary education students that the job market for those seeking summer employment or part-time work is brutal.

It's no secret that the recession has taken its toll on almost every facet of the Canadian society, and students are no exception.

However, leading economic indicators show that things may be picking up. This, too, is true in the

area of student employment.

Sarah Footman of the Canada Employment Centre for Students said some high school students may not understand Canada's current recession.

"University kids understand the economic situation," where high school kids tend to be a little more picky when it comes to jobs offered, she said.

The staff at the centre is finding another trend which does not bode well for high school students looking for work.

"A lot of jobs that would usually be taken by high school kids have been snapped up by university and college students," Footman said.

In an effort to balance this out, the centre has started a file called the 'odd job squad', in which students are hired on a temporary basis for tasks such as pool clean-

ing, moving, and serving at dinner parties.

Footman said businesses that were approached in April about hiring students and said they could not, are now starting to look for people to fill positions.

So far this year, the Georgetown office has accepted placements from 93 possible employers to fill positions ranging from sales representatives, to telemarketers, photographers to stock clerks.

Of the 93 employers, several are offering numerous positions, all of which can be viewed at the employment centre until August 1, 1992.

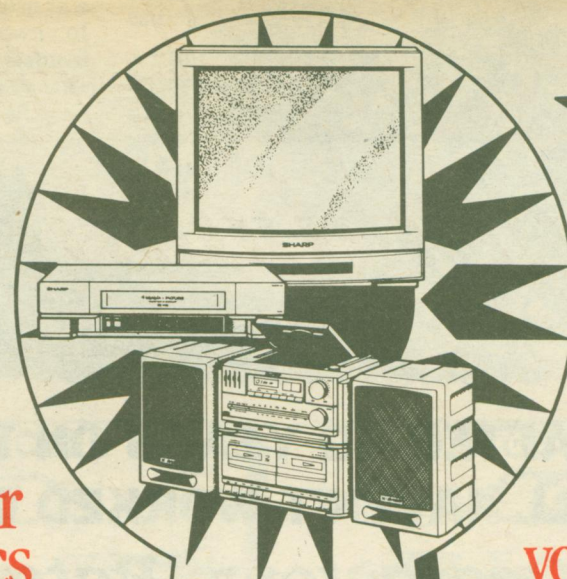
