

Rooftop pigeonhunter causes police blockade

A 42-year-old Brampton man hunting pigeons with a pellet rifle caused several tense moments and a lot of police activity in downtown Georgetown Friday afternoon.

Rush hour traffic was diverted from Mill St. east of Main St., while police blocked motorists and pedestrians from entering a triangular area bordered by Main St., Cross St., a back street running parallel to Guelph St., and the lower portion of Park Ave. near Mill St.

Halton Regional Police were called about 3:30 p.m. by a Mill St. resident who had observed a man on a nearby rooftop carrying what appeared to be a rifle. The man

was seen walking across the rooftop of the old post office building at 70 Mill Street. Investigation also revealed that the man had been in the clock tower portion of the building with a pellet rifle, a police media release said.

Residents and downtown business people gathered on the corner of Mill and Main Sts. in front of the Canadian Imperial Bank trying to get a glimpse of the gunman.

However, no one ever appeared on the rooftop and the crowd of onlookers dispersed about 6:45 p.m. when it was learned that the man had simply been carrying a pellet rifle and had been trying to rid the rooftop of pigeons.
