
T.D. Bank Padres 8 G.H. Woodworking Blue Jays 3

pressive style. Winning ugly, it might be termed.


Plus Welding again had problems getting any consistency out of their offence and for the most parts the Longhorns seemed content to let the Welders dictate the pace of the game.
