Dot Smith retires from HRPS

A small piece of policing history in Georgetown left 11 Division for the last time earlier this month.

After 23 years, Dot Smith — the longest serving civilian in the Halton Regional Police Service left the Georgetown detachment for the last time.

"I don't feel like I'm retiring," Smith said. "I'm 60 but I feel like I'm going to start another job.'

In 1974, the Georgetown Police Department — where Smith started her career — was absorbed into the Halton Regional Police Service and Smith moved into the position of secretary to the District Commander.

Performing what she called a "tremendous" job, Smith was a jack-of-all-trades - at times a statistician, accountant, letter writer, mathematician.

"I don't think you realize how much you do until you show someone else what you do," Smith said. "I honestly didn't realize all that I

Above all she has found her position "fascinating...I can't imagine doing anything else."


But her duties have not always

Smith vividly remembers an incident in the early 1970s when police found a 10-year-old boy who had fled a foster home.

"All this little boy wanted to do was find his mother," Smith said. "We knew his mother wanted to have nothing to do with him.

"He had the tiredest, saddest eyes I've ever seen," she added. "All we could do was give him some soup and then turn him over to the Children's Aid Society.

"My heart really went out to that little boy...I've never forgotten


