# Raiders closing in on new coach

The search for a coach may be almost finished for the Georgetown Chrysler Raiders.

Raiders general manager Finn Poulstrup said Thursday a replacement for Charlie Hanman could be in place as early as this weekend. Hanman and assistant coach Bert Osborne stepped down Sunday afternoon after Georgetown had suffered its 19th straight defeat.

"We're getting a real good sense of what we want to accomplish," Poulstrup said. "I think the candidates we're looking at are all good ones and the one we select will be able to do the job."

Candidates in line for the Raider bench boss job include assistant Jay Anderson, a former Raider

player and assistant coach (who is the club's interim coach until a new one is found), former team coach Peter Surgeon and long-time Raiders player Gary Ford.

Former NHL'er Jerome Dupont, now an assistant with the Metro League's Aurora Eagles, was also in the running, but he backed out earlier this week.

"Jerome wants to go to the NHL as a coach and I have no problem with that," Poulstrup said. "It's my understanding that he felt the odds for failure here were too

Poulstrup also maintained that the successful candidate will either assume both duties of coach and general manager, or at least be

aboard after the season is complete. Currently Poulstrup has worn both hats of the Raiders general manager and team president.

"If we can get someone who would dedicate himself to the job and can afford the time needed to do the job, I think that would be better for the organization,' Poulstrup said.

Poulstrup wouldn't officially say who the frontrunners for the job are, but hinted the former Raiders have definite appeal.

"They were here and played here and are part of the community even though they live out of town," Poulstrup said. "They are perceived that way by the people

able to bring a general manager and have that perception themselves."

Should the Raiders not be able to put a new coach in place before this weekend, Poulstrup has no reservations with putting Anderson behind the bench.

"We're really pleased with Jay," Poulstrup said. "I'm really glad he wanted to stay.

"I think it shows a lot of character on his part."

Even with the Raiders' woes, the team is still in the hunt for a Central League East Division playoff spot. Currently Georgetown and Royal York are tied for sixth place in the seven-team division standings. And despite having a 4-18 record (one win was a reversal

of a loss to Caledon after the Canadiens used an illegal player), Poulstrup doesn't feel Georgetown has a bad club.

"I think our problem was chemistry between the players and the Poulstrup said. coach," "Hopefully a new person coming in will be able to turn things

However Poulstrup said his club is in a dicey situation in its search for a new coach.

"We have to make certain we really look over the field, but also be decisive in our decision," he said. "I don't think the hockey club can take a lot of time in addressing this issue.'

### Novice Raiders continue winning ways
