a little over-confident and felt they didn't have to work as hard as they

"Then when they started losing they got confused and frustrated to the point where they've lost a lot of confidence. Once they get that confidence back I'm sure this team can be competitive again.'

However, he cautions the turnaround won't happen overnight.

"It's going to take some time," he said.

Ford also feels that with the club's relative youth, the lessons learned from this current losing streak will only serve to strengthen the players' character once they resume playing competitively

"They know what it's like to be down and kicked," Ford said. "Hopefully that will serve to scare them from slacking off."

However, any move to respectability has to come from the players, Ford added.

"There is light at the end of the tunnel," he said. "But that has to come from within. The onus is on them.'

With 24 games remaining in the regular season, Ford's long-range goal is to make the playoffs. Currently the Raiders are tied for the sixth and final playoff spot in the seven-team East Division with Royal York.

Ford had no qualms with having Anderson remain as an assistant coach. The two were assistants three years ago, Sturgeon's final season as coach of the Raiders.

"Jay is good man," Ford said in a sincere tone. "I was glad when he said he would consider staying on because we got along well three years ago and it's half the battle having someone headed in the same direction as you are."

Anderson was disappointed with not getting the head-coaching job, but feels very confident he can work with Ford.

"Of all the candidates they were considering, Gary was the one I felt I could best work with," said Anderson, who was seriously considered for the Oakville coaching job when Ken Moodie moved over to St. Mike's. "We really worked well together three years ago.'

On the ice, the Raiders trailed Caledon 3-2 heading into the third period before the visiting Canadiens outscored the home team 4-1 in the third. Trevor Brandt, Bryan Gendron and Ante Galic had the goals.


