Novices earn three wins

This past week The Beaver Lumber Major Novices played four games, collecting three wins and a loss, to bring their season record at the Christmas break to an impressive 18-2-4.

Last Wednesday at Memorial, visiting Burlington was handed a 3-1 defeat by the Georgetown Raiders. Kyle Hotham led the attack with two goals and an assist. The first two Georgetown markers came 27 seconds apart in the first period. Hotham scored the opener, after taking the puck from Ronny Larocque and Brandon Valente deflected in the game winner from Hotham's shot, and Alex Durham also assisted. Burlington found the net early in the third, but then Hotham tallied the insurance goal, when he deflected in Ryan Field's blue line shot. Larocque collected a second assist on that play.

The next night the Raiders battled a winter storm to get to Orangeville, and made it worthwhile by blanking out their hosts,

McCulloch and Valente each contributed a goal, while assists went to McCulloch, Snow, Kevin Binsell and Ryan Busby. Goalie Ryan LaRose notched his third season shut-out.

Raiders will split up general manger's job

Club officials met last week to discuss the position, which has been held the past two seasons by team president Finn Poulstrup. Poulstrup was hoping that with the appointment of new coach Gary Ford three weeks ago, the naming of a new general manager would soon follow. However, such hasn't been the case.

Yet, Poulstrup said a change could be made in the next couple of weeks that would see the post split up among three individuals.

Ford would be coach and general manager, with an assistant general manager and director of player personnel also splitting up the duties. Poulstrup said Ford, who assumed coaching duties after Charlie Hanman stepped down, has a couple of individuals in mind for the new positions.

"Our goal this year was to get a new general manager at the start of the year, but it didn't work out that way because we couldn't find the time (to address issue)," Poulstrup said. "But we've the time, and with the change in coach we have a golden opportunity to do it especially with Gary bringing in more

"Gary went into the dressing room and told the guys that no one gets traded until he shows he's worth trading for," Poulstrup said. "If a player can prove he's worth trading for something of equal value in return, then we'll talk."
