Life under winter skies Dave's Diversions By David Featherstone

To me, the early fall months have always represented a rich pageantry of nature's bounty, on display for all to see. However, as autumn fades into winter, the colors fade and the days grow shorter. The bounty of the harvest is all but for-

Winter is often referred to as "the little death", a time when natural life processes are at their lowest ebb. Nature appears to be husbanding its resources, awaiting the return of spring before returning to its full potential. However, under the winter sky, the vitality of life for many species continues unabat-

In the headwaters of our local streams, brook trout and brown trout embryos are developing under gravel-strewn springs and riffles. Embryos that survive the winter ice and late winter floods will emerge from their riverbed shelters in the spring.

Throughout the Great Lakes, legions of rainbow trout are assembling off the mouths of their natal tributaries. Here, they will gather their strength, waiting for the warm freshets of late winter and early spring before dashing upstream to spawn.

Within our local forests, whitetailed deer gather in "yards" to browse on the buds and twigs of shrubs and trees. The fawns of next spring are quickly developing within pregnant does. Unless the winter is unusually harsh, most fawns will come into the world in excellent condition.

To the north, female black bears give birth to their cubs in January and February. While the mother sleeps in the den, her tiny, hairless offspring nestle into her fur for shelter and feeding. Black bear cubs emerge from their den in the spring fully developed. With their mother's help they are ready to take

on the outside world.

Although many wonderful life processes continue to operate throughout the winter months, one fact cannot be ignored.

The winter months represent a critical period for our wildlife. Resources are scarce and climactic conditions are demanding. However, a strong undercurrent of new life is swelling in our streams and forests, awaiting the cues of

spring to come forth into abun-

A great effort by all team members and excellent goal tending by Stephen Paulin and Simon Deeley.




