#### SHAFT FLEX

The flex of a golf shaft is simply defined as how flexible or stiff the shaft is The amount of shaft flexing that occurs during a swing is determined by the club-head's speed, the clubhead's centre of gravity location, the distribution of weight within the head itself, and the attributes of the particular shaft.

During the backswing and the start of the downswing the weight and motion o the clubhead causes the shaft to bend, storing energy in the shaft. The best results are obtained when the shaft is just stiff enough to recover to a straight configuration exactly when the ball is hit. When this happens all of the stored energy is converted to energy of motion and contributes to clubhead speed. In addition with the shaft straight at impact, the clubface is square to the ball.

When determining which shaft flex is suitable for your swing try hitting clubs with different shaft flexes. This will enable you to better understand the role of shaft flex in hitting a golf ball.
