

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PLUG IN-C

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Our house was once heated with oil and was dry in the winter. Now that we have a high-efficiency gas furnace, we are plagued with excessive moisture that causes condensation on windows and mould along the walls. How can we eliminate this problem?

Your older, less efficient oil-fired system sent a lot of combustion gases up the chimney. This created a negative pressure in the house that resulted in forced infiltration of drier outside air.

Newer, more efficient furnaces not only generate less combustion bases and require a much smaller means of exhaust, but they also get the make-up air they need directly from outside, which does not induce infiltration. The net result is that interior moisture is no longer diluted

with the drier outside air and, over a period of time, too much moisture builds up in the house unless it is ventilated or other strategies are used to bring back some equilibrium.

One such strategy is to add a small duct, no bigger than 4 inches in diameter, from outside to the return air duct of the furnace. This fresh air duct should have a hand-operated damper installed somewhere in its length to regulate or shut off the air supply as needed.

It should be protected outside by a dryer-type wall jack with the wind flap replaced with small mesh screening to keep out large insects and rodents.

I read in your column about a problem similar to mine: bathroom fans vented to the roof, water running down the duct into the fan

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Add a lot of comfort for a little money. Your retailer can show you how. Caulk around window and door frames, and anywhere else air might escape. Weatherstrip at doors and windows or any other joints that open. Keep the heat on the inside, where it belongs. And when you're buying for the home, always insist on energy saving products — common sense saves.

housing and condensation in the attic. Your solution is to vent the fans through a gable wall. My house is a ranch house with a 5-foot tall attic. And if I understand correctly what a gable is, we don't have any.

A gable is the triangular wall area under an A-roof and gambrel roof. (An A-roof looks like a playing card folding in half.) It forms the end walls of an attic or rooms under such a roof. If your ranch house has an A-roof, there are gables at

each end. If you have a hip roof – a roof sloping on all sides – you don't

If you have a hip roof, venting bath and kitchen fans is more of a problem. It may have to be done through an unvented part of a soffit or the lower part of the roof unless it can be done by running the duct down into the basement and out through the band joist – a much better way in cold climes.

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
