#### SHAFTS - FLEXPOINT

The flexpoint or kickpoint in a shaft is where the shaft bends during the swing such as the tip area, the middle of the shaft, or in the butt area of the shaft. This element (flexpoint) helps control ball trajectory, directional control, and gives the player a certain swing 'feel'. the higher the flexpoint on a shaft the lower the trajectory of the ball. many players prefer the lower trajectory. They feel they can control their shots better. The lower the flexpoint on a shaft the higher the ball will go. Many beginning players and high handicap players prefer this type of shot. Not only for overall shot making, but confidence as well. Steel shafts typically have mid to high flexpoints, although most manufacturers will have at least one low flexing shaft. The composites (graphite) are available in different flexpoints, including low, mid and high.

Poulstrup is also pleased with the support shown by the Georgetown fans considering the team's record and the financial times. Georgetown once again led the league in attendance.


"The team showed a lot of character this year and everybody can hold their heads up high," said Poulstrup.
