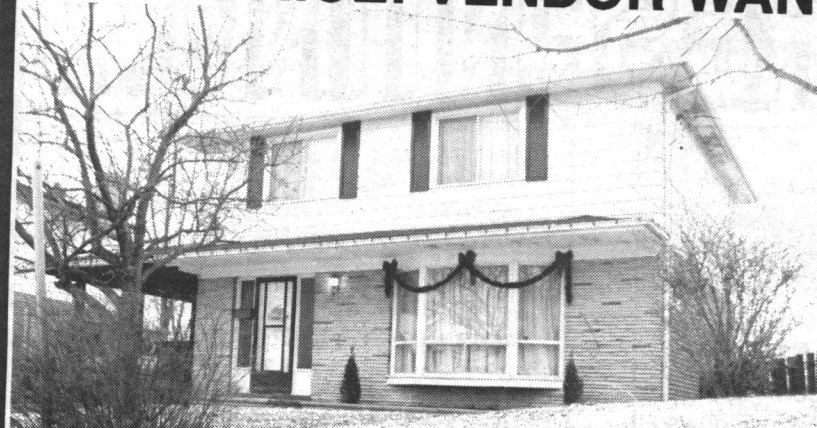


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Alternate tower location now under consideration

Representatives of Rogers Cantel Inc. have bowed to public pressure and agreed to look for a better site for a 340-foot communications tower.

The company's pledge to work co-operatively with Halton Hills Town Council and residents on the western edge of Acton to find an acceptable, site was made by Cantel representative Charles Ross at a public meeting in Acton last week.

About 70 residents crowded into the Acton firehall to voice their concern over the planned construction of the tower near a rural cluster of homes, north of Highway 7 at its juncture with Dublin Line. Residents voiced strong opposition to the proposal, putting Cantel officials on the defensive about future plans for the site and perceived health hazards related to emissions from the tower.

"There has been a lot of concern about this proposal," veterinarian Ron Trenton told Cantel representatives and town council members at the meeting. Dr. Trenton, who lives in the Dublin Line area, was one of eight rural Acton residents who spoke to the audience. All residents criticized the proposed location of the cellular transmission facility, or tower, and suggested it be placed elsewhere.

"We've petitioned and discussed and held public meetings over this and we're 100 per cent unanimously opposed to construction of this tower (in our neighborhood)," Trenton said. The tower isn't compatible with the rural character of the area and should be located elsewhere, he argued.

Area residents Steve Kidd, Elizabeth Kelly and Rod Gardiner suggested that the height and power requirements of the tower have made them suspicious about other uses that might be added to the site in the future.

"What kind of voltage will be running into the site?" Kidd asked. "There seems to be an overkill of power for the tower," he noted, speculating that the amount of power indicates "something hidden in the future."

Gardiner asked for assurance that high-energy radiation from the tower won't cause any short-term or long-term health problems for his family.

Ross said the tower emits radio waves, not radiation. The low power ultra-high frequency electromagnetic field (EMF) produced by the structure is "safer than high bands of your television," he said.

To allow Cantel representatives to answer residents' concerns and investigate the possibility of other sites for the tower, mayor Rusty Miller suggested that another public meeting be held.

The next meeting is expected to be held 6:30 p.m., Thursday. Its location has not yet been confirmed, but will be determined early next week.

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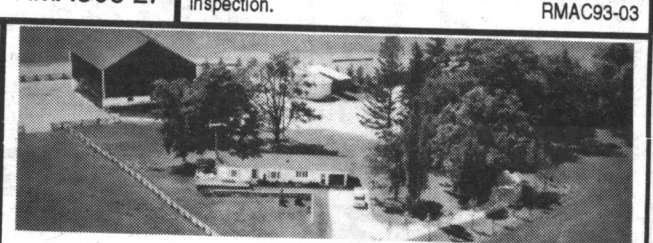
