Trial date held over

Regional policeman facing charges of attempting to obstruct justice won't be announced until April 19 at Milton provincial court.

The court appearance date for 46-year-old Sergeant Rod Wilson, of Burlington, was expected to be announced Monday, but the announcement has been postponed for a month, a court official said this week.

The obstruction charges against Sgt. Wilson relate to a recorded message left eight months ago on the telephone answering machine of Halton Hills Councillor Pam Johnston. The tape was turned over to Halton Regional Police Service and an investigation was conducted by the Professional Standards Bureau. As a result, a Police Services Act charge of discreditable conduct was laid against the Halton policeman.

The trial date for a Halton the Regional Director of Crown Attorneys, L.J. McGuigan, Q.C. The contents of the telephone message led to the attempting to obstruct justice charge against Sgt.

Sgt. Wilson has been booked off sick since the charge was laid in mid-February.

The charge is connected with events which occurred last May. At that time, Councillor Johnston, who also sits on regional council, received an anonymous letter alleging a cover-up by Halton police administration on a domestic assault incident that occurred in 1983. An internal investigation conducted by the OPP concluded last June there was no wrongdoing by police administration.

Love Spoons

Around the 17th century, giving wooden hand-carved gifts to loved ones was general all over the country, but the giving of spoons originated in Wales. They were given to a girl as a prelude to courting as an indication that the boy was interested in her. This was not necessarily a commitment. There are no hard and fast designs for the spoons. They can be as elaborate or as plain as the imagination of the carver allows. However, various symbols have become traditionally an integral part of the spoon. The flat stem of the spoons, often very wide, developed as the carver wanted more room to display his skills. Thus the spoons gradually evolved further and further away from the original utilitarian design. A few of the spoons' symbols and their significance are: - a wheel or spade - willingness to work for a loved one; key, keyholes, house, locks - my house is yours; vines, trees, leaves growing love; horseshoe good luck and happiness.
