

1992 Waste reduction award-winner

Town of Halton Hills Mayor Russ Miller accepted the 1992 Waste Minimization Award from Halton Region chairman Peter Pomeroy at Wednesday's regional council meeting in Oakville.

The plaque recognizes the town's success in waste reduction achieved through several initiatives including the town's program of yard and leaf waste collection.

Police Beat

Cemetery fence damaged

The chain link fence between the Fairview Cemetery in Acton and the condominium buildings beside it was damaged on three consecutive nights. Police are still investigating the incident which took place between March 23-25.

Stereo stolen

A car stereo, valued at \$300, was stolen from a locked car near Highway 7 and Winston Churchill Blvd. on March 26. Police are continuing their investigation.

headline - Suspended license

A 36 year-old Georgetown man was charged with impaired driving after being stopped by police Saturday night. The man, who was swerving across both lanes, had been driving with a suspended license.

Spot-check dodged

Police charged a 22 year-old Georgetown man with impaired driving and with having over 80 milligrams of alcohol in his bloodstream Saturday night. The man had attempted to avoid a spot-check when he was stopped.

Fail to remain

Saturday night, the side door of a black Honda Civic was slammed into by another automobile on 5 Side Road, causing \$500 damage. The passenger of the Civic was still in the car and called police despite the suspects pleas not to do so. The investigation is continuing.

Verbal assault

A Georgetown woman was verbally threatened by her former husband when she went to pick up the children who were spending the past weekend with their father. The man attempted to physically restrain her from leaving, but was not successful. Police cautioned the man but did not lay charges.

Quick scam

A man went into Lakeview Convenience in Acton and ran out a few minutes later with a carton of cigarettes. The cashier had laid the carton down on the counter and turned to get a lighter, when the young man fled. Police are investigating the incident.

Region Briefs

The leaf collection program was introduced on a trial basis in the fall of 1991 and was expanded last year to include both leaf collection in the fall and yard waste collection in the spring.

Water connection deferred

In response to a recommendation from Halton Hills regional councillor Marilyn Serjeantson, regional council agreed Wednesday to defer a proposal asking Peel Region to consider an interim water pipe connection from its Meadowvale Reservoir to Halton. Serjeantson asked for a deferral to allow time for regional staff to make a presentation about the proposed connection to councils of the two communities most affected by the proposal, Halton Hills and Milton.

Burlington Mayor Walter Mulkeewich also suggested a deferral is appropriate because requesting water from Peel could be seen as pre-empting work being conducted by the study team working on the Halton Urban Structure

Review, which is considering both short-term and long-term water supply options for Halton.

Road closure okayed

Maple Avenue in Georgetown, (Regional Road 11) will be temporarily closed April 24 to allow for a soapbox derby between Delrex Blvd. and Main Street. The races, which will be held from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, will feature several flat-top racers designed and built by senior elementary school students from across Halton. They are part of a program arranged for the Halton Technical Olympics being hosted this year by Georgetown District High School.

Although regional staff recommended denial of the road closure, the region's planning committee and regional council granted approval Wednesday. Staff were concerned about traffic re-routing and inconvenience to motorists resulting from the road closure. However, regional chairman Peter Pomeroy said any inconveniences could be handled competently by town staff.

Fabric Care TIPS

NOW YOU SEE IT. NOW YOU DON'T...

Winter is over. You start to pack away your warm and woolly items and pull out those lighter weight fabrics in anticipation of spring. "But what's this? Is it some cruel joke? I know these clothes were clean when I put them away," you say to yourself. "But now they are covered with ugly brown stains."

"Invisible stains" are caused by foods and beverages, perspiration, and hair sprays, which, when spilled, originally caused only a damp area on your clothes.

For instance, if you spill ginger ale on your clothing and blot up the stain, it seems to disappear. But, in fact, the stain is still there and with heat and time, the stain will oxidize and turn brown. Oxidized stains can also appear after you store your garments in a warm closet or in the attic during the summer.

Barragers offers the following tips to avoid permanent staining by "invisible" and tannin stains.

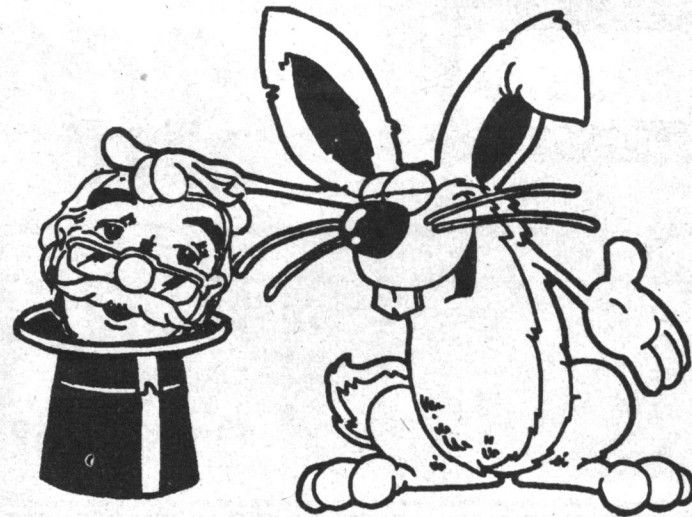
Have the article cleaned as soon as possible after it is stained. Once a stain is set, it's much harder to get out, if it will come out at all.

Always have garments cleaned before storing them. Not only could the "invisible" stains become visible during storage, but food and beverage stains, even "invisible" stains, are an insect's invitation to munch on clothing.
