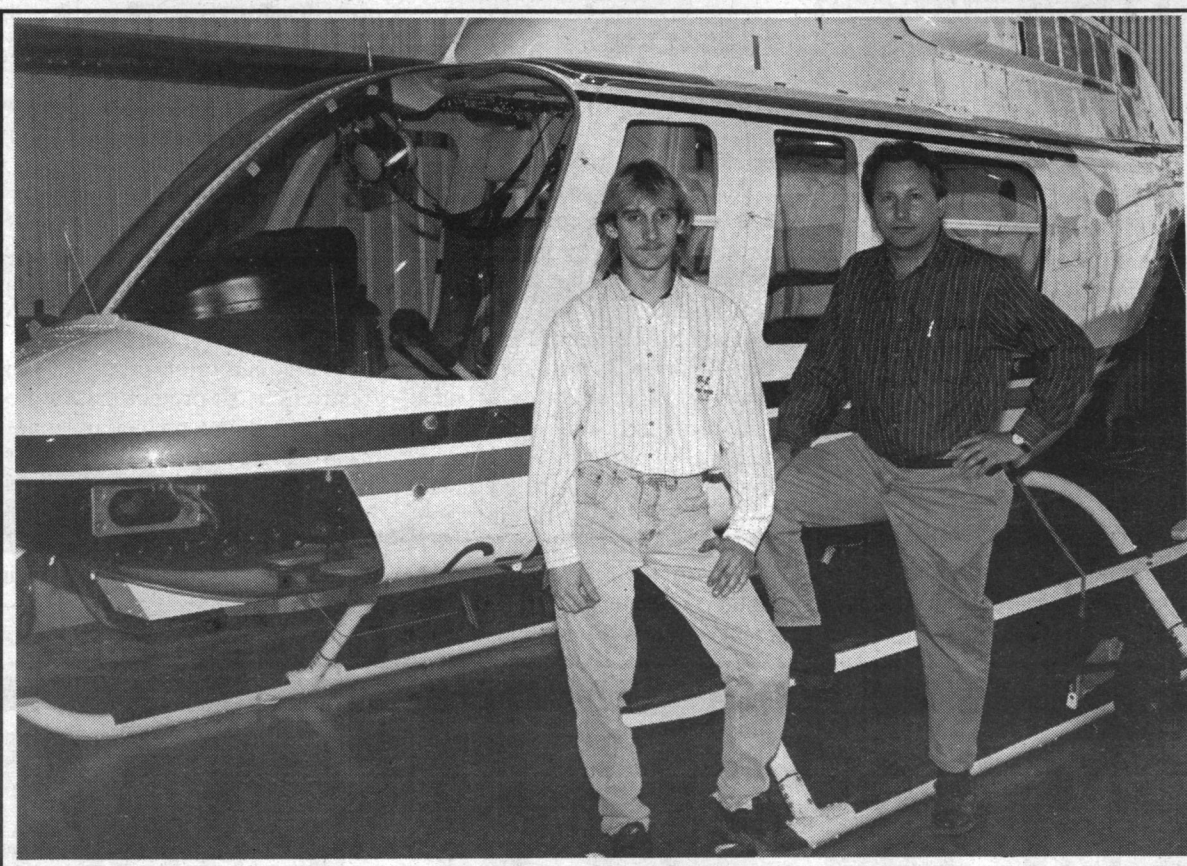

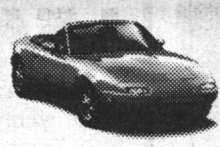

Halton residents rewarded for bravery

Two Halton Hills residents who helped a pilot land his damaged helicopter safely, will be receiving awards at the annual Halton Life Saving/Service Recognition Awards Banquet Thursday evening (tomorrow) at the Holiday Inn in Burlington.

Doug Rock, of Georgetown, and Christopher D. Sallay of Glen Williams, worked with two Milton men, Timothy Kunica and Kenneth Bass, in preparing a device which enabled a helicopter with a broken strut and a missing pontoon to land.

"It (the stand) was made of a steel mesh-like material," explained Rock, "so it wasn't very sturdy. We had to hold down the helicopter so that it wouldn't topple over."

Rock remembers the event clearly. He described how he had to reach through a hole in the front window of the helicopter to reach a second set of earphones which would enable him to communicate with the pilot, Russell Dawson.

The engine would not shut down because of jammed controls and Rock had to use a fire extinguisher to shut it down. Fortunately, no one was hurt during the incident.

All four men received a medal of bravery from Governor-General Ray Hnatyshyn in December. Sallay explained that since the incident, he adds the initials "M.B." (Medal of Bravery) to his name. "It's an honor that was awarded to us by the governor-general. I'm proud of it."
