The Pries Family Trophy went to Milwood Construction who defeated Georgetown Honda 3-2 in the Bantam division.

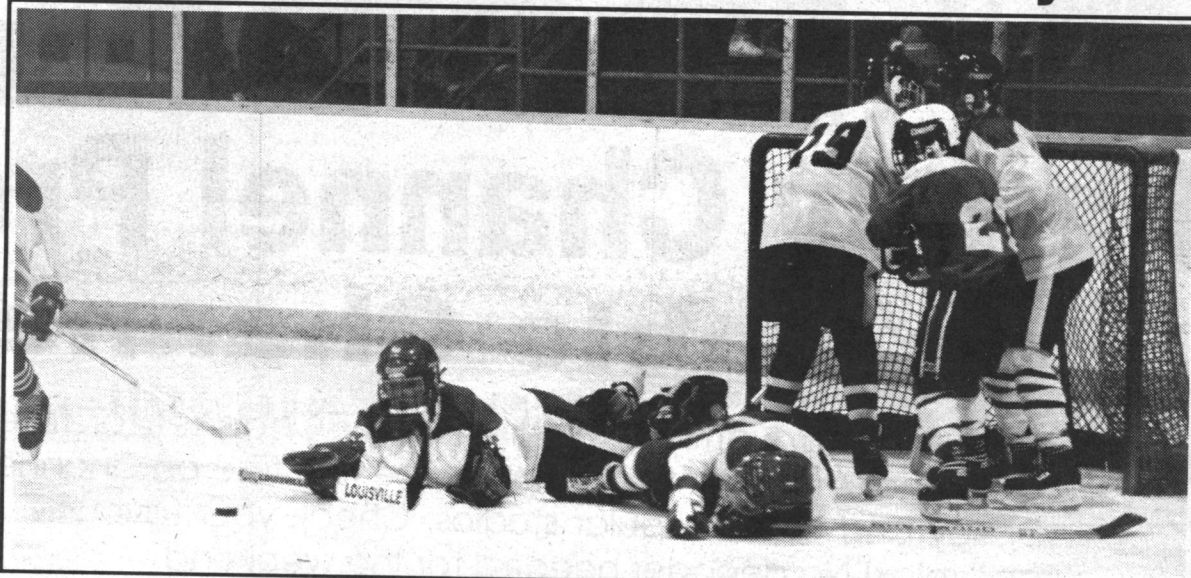
The Hal Pells President's Cup went to McGibbon Hotel in the Midget / Juvenile division as they defeated The Lions Club 7-3.
