Organ donation program launched

The By Mutual Consent organ donation program in Halton Hills, was launched at the Halton Hills Civic Centre Thursday morning.

Mayor Miller was present, along with various employees of Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital, Fire Chief Bill Cunningham, representatives from the Halton Region Police Service and several organ recipients.

"The goal of the program is to break down the barriers of organ donation," explained Bruce Field, branch manager of the Mutual Group, which organized the program. "It's not a pleasant topic," he added, "but it's a chance to discuss your wishes with your family and make sure they are respected."

The presentation began with a video which referred to organ donor Victor Davis, organ recipient Cal Murphy, and Erin Crocker, an 11-year-old awaiting an organ transplant.

Mayor Miller came forward, with

version of the organ donor card which was distributed to all those present.

Maureen Jacob, a Georgetown resident who had a kidney transplant 21 years ago, told her story. "It was such a change," she insisted. "I could even eat food which people take for granted. I am so grateful to the donor and the fami-

Stephen Moore also spoke of his kidney transplant. Moore is currently sports co-ordinator for the Canadian Transplant Games Association.

Members of the hospital staff praised the program. "We're very happy to be involved in the undertaking of this program," maintained John Oliver, executive director of the hospital. Chief of medical staff Donald Trant similarly commended the program.

Halton-Peel MP Garth Turner was not able to attend the event but in a letter, Turner offered his "best his wife Gerry, and signed a larger wishes and personal support."

River St. bridge due for repairs

At the Halton Regional Council meeting Wednesday afternoon, bylaw 55-93, concerning the cost change involved in the repairing of the River St. bridge in Georgetown underwent its first, second and third readings.
