Special memorial service

Each individual is unique, and because of this we all manage our feelings and emotions differently. This is especially true during traumatic times such as the death of a loved one.

To help ease the pain of the loss of loved ones who have recently died at Georgetown hospital, the hospital's Pastoral Care and Social Work Services will be holding a special memorial service, "A Time to Remember" on Thursday, May 20, 1993 from 12:15 to 1:15 p.m. in the hospital boardroom.

Eunice McGowan, head of Social Work at Georgetown hospital, explains the service plays an important role for families, friends and the community.

"By allowing ourselves to mourn, we undertake an essential part of the healing process. The "Time to Remember" memorial service at Georgetown hospital is similar to others held regularly in hospitals throughout North America in that it gives people the opportunity to honor the memory of their loved one, and share their feelings with caring and understanding relatives and friends".

And while the mourning process is usually associated with the fami-



ly and friends of the deceased, hospital staff also need time to grieve.

"Medical personnel often develop a close relationship with patients and their families. The memorial service enables our staff to again demonstrate their support for the families, and lend support to each other during the grieving process," McGowan adds.
