## Stormwater pond decision deferred

Two delegations addressed Town of Halton Hills general committee meeting Monday night regarding the Stormwater Quality Management Pond in the Maple Creek Subdivision. Bob Evans represented citizens of the Metcalfe Court, Danridge Crescent and Regan Crescent area who were concerned about the proposed location of the pond.

Ken Poulsen, president of Trafalgar Engineering, described the project as "environmentally friendly" and requested that council finalize the draft for the development so that they can get on with Phase 2.

Evans explained that during an April 22 meeting between the residents, Trafalgar Engineering, Milran Developments, the Ministry of Natural Resources and the Engineering Department staff, several options were discussed. Evans added they had agreed "to use the developer's contributions to implement recommendations of the Georgetown's South Master Drainage Plan Update," which was described as a "win, win, win, win

situation." Sometime between April 22 and Monday's meeting, Evans said, Trafalgar Engineering and Milran Developments changed their minds.

When Councillor Ron Chatten asked Poulsen if he had agreed to this option, Poulsen hesitated before answering, "We agreed that it was an option."

It was recommended that a decision be deferred until June 7, giving town staff a chance to study the options before returning the report to council.

#### Developer donating trees

Councillors accepted Halton Hills Village Homes Inc.'s offer to plant a tree per lot in its subdivision as well as the donation of an extra 75 trees on community owned lands in lieu of the removal of the existing wood lot. Their acceptance was based on an amendment to change the number of trees from 50 to 75. Toby Barwick of Halton Hills Village Homes explained the wood lot would have to be removed

because development grades had to be increased by two metres. Councillor Gail Rutherford admitted that 75 trees would be better than 50, but "whether it's 75, 100 or 200, we can't replace the wood lot." Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson suggested that some of the corner lots be used to plant more trees, but was told by the Town's director of planning, Ian Keith, that this would be possible only if the Town buys the lots. "I would like to save the wood lot too," admitted Councillor Ron Chatten, "but I think it's too late now. We should have done something in 1985. We have to be realistic."

### Honor system for parking

Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital has taken an innovative approach to offsetting operating costs with the introduction of its new Voluntary Contributions Program. The details of the program were initially presented at a community forum held April 7. As outlined during the public discussion, the program is designed to use voluntary contributions from staff, physicians, patients and visitors to offset the costs of maintaining the parking lots and surrounding grounds. Operating expenses are estimated to be approximately \$65,000 per year.

Coin drop boxes are now conveniently located at all entrances to the hospital, with prominent signs displayed. As Randy Esford, Georgetown Hospital's Assistant Executive Director explains, "We believe the Voluntary Contributions Program is a practical alternative to a paid parking program. However, the support of our staff and the public is vital for its success."
