Cadets annual inspection

Thirty members of #676 Royal Canadian (Army) Cadet Corps (affiliated with the Lorne Scots P.D. and H. Regiment) performed their annual inspection ceremonial on Wednesday at the Fairgrounds, by the Armory, in Georgetown.

Lieutenant Colonel R. Irvine, CD - Commanding Officer of The

Lorne Scots (Peel, Dufferin and Halton Regiment) was the inspecting officer. Also on parade were The Pipes and Drums of the Regiment.

The cadet unit is commended by Captain J. H. Harrison, CD of Georgeto-

wn, and he is assisted by four other officers on the cadet instructor list, plus one civilian volunteer.

Cadet parade commander for the annual inspection was cadet Warrant Officer M. Deryck. The event included demonstrations planned and organized by the cadets themselves. Static displays were also set up in the Armory showing the cadets' involvement in winter living, etc.

The annual inspection completes the local training for #676 corps.

Members of the corps will be traveling to Washington, D.C. in late June on a 10-day cultural visit. They will participate in Canada Day ceremonies at the Canadian Embassy and on July 4 will join with their hosts in celebrating Independence Day.

During the months of July and August, cadets will be attending annual summer training programs at Camp Ipperwash.

The aim of the Cadet organization is to develop in youth the attributes of good citizenship and leadership; to promote physical fitness; and to stimulate an interest in the activities of the Canadian Forces.

Young people 12 to 18 years of age may enroll in Cadets. The new training year will commence September 8 at The Armory located in the Georgetown Fair Grounds.

Army cadets are sponsored by the Optimist Club of Georgetown, The Lorne Scots Regimental Association and the Cadet League of Canada in partnership with the Department of National Defense.
