Gill ended the ceremony by congratulating all students, and wishing them luck in the upcoming year.

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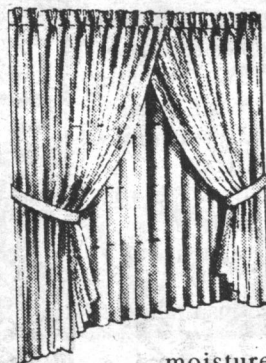
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
