D.A.R.E. program well received

At Holy Cross School last Wednesday afternoon, 96 proud students from three Georgetown schools - Holy Cross, St. Francis of Assisi and Sacre Coeur received certificates of achievement in completing curriculum in D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education).

The D.A.R.E. program was developed in 1983 by the Los Angeles Police Department and the Los Angeles Unified School District to help children say no to drugs. It was so successful it spread across the United States and then to Oakville in 1989 through a combined effort of the Rotary Club and the Halton Regional Police Service.

According to information from the D.A.R.E. Foundation "As of January 1993, with the cooperation of both the Halton Board of Education and the Halton Roman Catholic School Board, 6,700 Grade 6 students have successfully completed and graduated from the D.A.R.E. program in Halton." It was evident the graduating students last Wednesday were appreciative of what they had learned and proud to declare their participation in the program by sporting D.A.R.E. T-shirts.

The group of young people and relatives attending the ceremony were addressed by Constable Flameling, who had taught the 17-week program at St. Francis and Sacre Coeur. He said he wanted to impress upon the graduates that they have been provided with "life skills for the future" and it was up to them to make good decisions.

He pointed out their decisions affect not only themselves but they are "role models for brothers and sisters and young people who look up to you".

The respect shown by the students for their peers as they presented what they had learned from the program through speeches, raps and a skit, and the quality of the presentations themselves, demonstrated the likelihood these graduates will be good examples indeed to those who follow, perhaps even to some ahead.

The program consists of 17 onehour segments and uses a variety of techniques to teach self esteem, drug awareness, the influence of the media, and methods of saying no when approached to use drugs.

A D.A.R.E. officer is given 80 hours of specific instruction and Constable Kartz, enjoying her first year as a D.A.R.E. officer, taught the program at Holy Cross.
