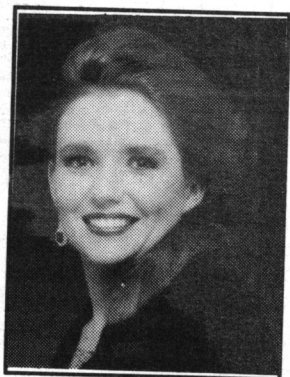


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Conservation authorities urge restructuring

A second, more detailed "Blueprint for Success" was presented by the Association of Conservation Authorities of Ontario to the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) June 22, in an effort to save taxpayers \$100 million.

The blueprint addressed duplication of services between the association, MNR, and the Ministry of Energy and the Environment (MOEE). "We would like to provide one-window resource management delivery," explained Vicki Barron, chair of the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

The blueprint recommends natural resource management be planned and implemented on a watershed ecosystem basis. "Currently there are 16 agencies involved with

Credit River area because everyone has a concern with it," Barron said. "If it is dealt with on a watershed basis instead of geographical boundaries, for example, this problem (duplication) will be eliminated."

Another recommendation is the water management responsibilities of the MNR and MOEE be combined. "MNR becomes involved when there is too much water, and MOEE, if there is not enough water or if water quality is a concern," Barron said. "I think both issues can be dealt with by one Ministry."

The final proposal is provincial ministries focus their attention on the strategic planning aspects of resource management, including legislation, regulation, policy research and province-wide planning.

This blueprint was issued

following a mid-May meeting with Natural Resource Minister Howard Hampton, who asked for detailed proposals to the preliminary recommendations. "We're expect a provincial response by the end of July," Barron forecasts.

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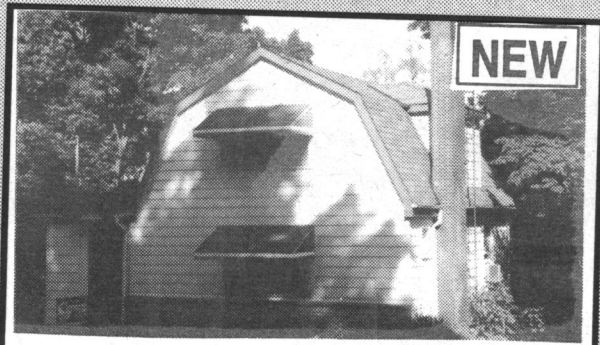
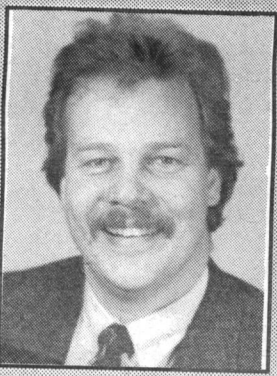


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
