Silver Creek Lookout Trail close at hand

Here's another loop walk near Georgetown of about 4.5 km in length. Proceed north on Trafalgar Road from Hwy 7 and turn right on to 27 Sideroad. Where 27 Sideroad meets 8th Line, jog left and then right to continue on 27 Sideroad. At the bottom of the hill there is a shoulder on the right where you can park.

Follow the white blazes of the Bruce Trail along the road and across Silver Creek. Shortly after the bridge, the trail turns right into the woods. Follow the blazes carefully because this area is used extensively by the students at the Silver Creek Education Centre and there are many unmarked trails. You will shortly emerge onto Fallbrook Road and cross it to continue on the trail. Soon you will come to the start of the Silver Creek Lookout Trail, blazed in blue.

Continue on the main trail as it follows the Escarpment slope. Keep an eye open for the blue blazes of the other end of the side trail. It will be




