Victoria

Victoria has been the capital of British Columbia since 1871 and it continues to resemble the outpost of the British Empire that it once was. In the city centre, the narrow streets are lined with handsome 19th-century stone buildings and great baskets overflowing with flowers, grace the lampposts.

You can hardly go five minutes in the city centre without running into some of the fascinating history. The Royal B.C. Museum houses 12,000 years of British Columbia history and right next door is the Helmcken House built in 1852 by one of Victoria's earliest doctors. A short distance away, there's Craigdarrock Castle, a massive, outstanding landmark home that dates to the 1880's. The home of famous Canadian artist Emily Carr still exists too.

For a special afternoon, visit the magnificently restored Empress Hotel (built in 1908), for afternoon tea in its splendid Tea Lobby.

A romantic way to see Victoria is to catch the Tally Ho, one of the horse-drawn carriages that have been clip-clopping their way about town for 85 years.

Experienced travellers consider Victoria one of the quaintest, safest cities; they also find it easy to get around because the city centre is so compact. However, Victoria's greatest charm is that it is incredibly civilized, with an ambience of warm, welcoming gentility.
