

League sends message to competing teams

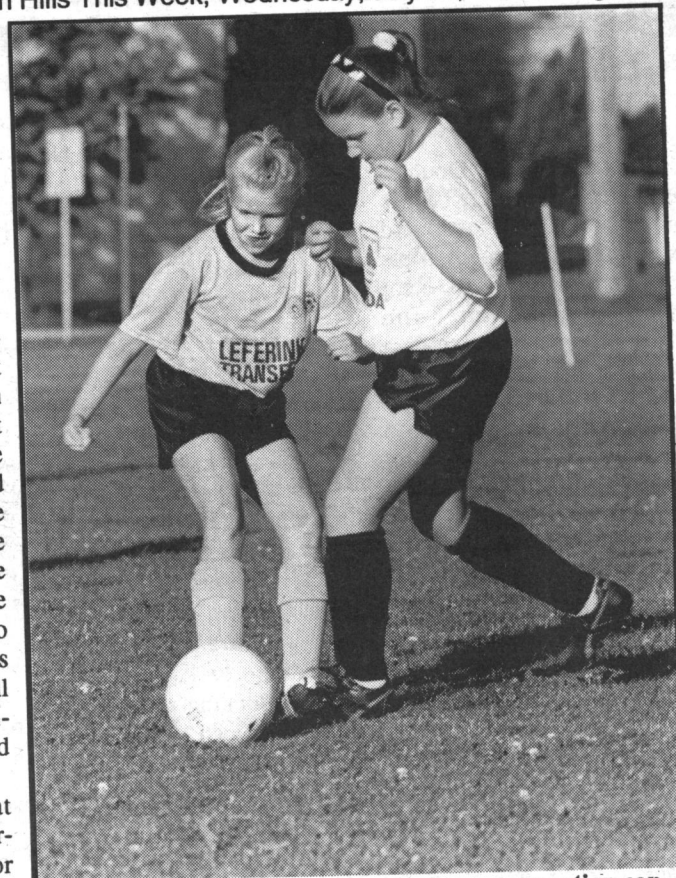
team. Blazers at Meadowvale were the victims of an internal club field allocation change. The SM club pulled the field from Meadowvale and this match was recast to last Monday.

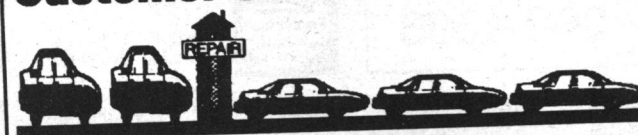
