## Graduated licensing just around the bend

. Time is running out for want-to-be drivers hoping to bypass the provincial government's graduated licensing program.

Although the NDP government hasn't released the actual date when the program takes effect, Anne McLaughlin, with the Ministry of Transportation, says the program will be in full operation in the spring of 1994.

New drivers who get their license before the program starts won't be subjected to the restrictions under graduated licensing.

However, a clerk at an area driver's examination centre says that the next available date to book a road test is the first week of December.

"We do realize that some people are more interested in getting their license prior to the program coming into effect," admits McLaughlin, adding that when the program starts it could take a new driver up to two years

license.

The program consists of two levels for all new drivers, which gradually increases driving privileges during the driver's first two years on the road.

"The ministry is looking for ways to improve safety. New drivers need more time to sharpen their skills in the more demanding situations," explains McLaughlin.

Ministry of Transportation statistics show that although drivers under the age of 25 make up about one-sixth of all licensed drivers in Ontario, they represent almost one-quarter of all drivers killed in collisions. And, it is estimated that Ontario residents spend about \$4 billion annually on health care, property damage, insurance claims and lost wages resulting from collisions.

Under the graduated licensing program, new drivers have a number of restrictions in level one, such as driving at night, driving alone, driving after drinking any alcohol, driving with too

before they have a full many passengers and driving last a minimum of 12 on high-speed highways.

Level one will last 12 months, unless the new driver completes an approved. must maintain a zero blood driver education course, which could reduce the period to eight months at their request.

At the end of level one, drivers are required to pass a road test before being eligible to proceed to level two.

The following level will

months, and allows for more driving privileges. The only restrictions are that the driver alcohol level while driving and limit the number of passengers to the number of seatbelts in the vehicle.

After completing level two, drivers must take a test on advanced driving skills in order to quality for full license privileges.

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
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
