North Halton Golf and Country Club plays host to the next stop on the tour this Friday.

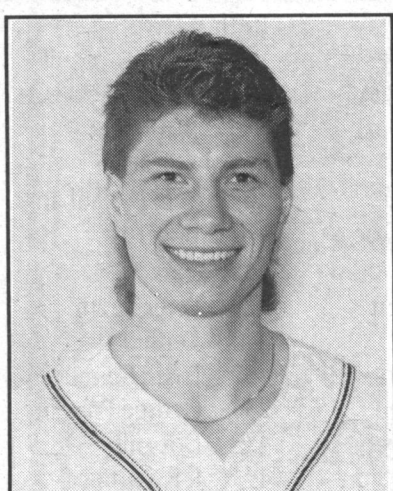
