The Selection Committee of the Halton Regional Police Services Board will hold an in-camera meeting tomorrow (Thursday), involving the entire board to reveal the 12 final applicants for the post of Halton Region Police Chief to replace the retiring Chief James Harding.

Barry Quinn, chair of the board and member of the

Selection Committee, said the names of the applicants will not be released to save any embarrassment if they do not get the position, or if their present employers do not know about their applications. Twenty-one applications were initially received.

The entire board will decide which applicants will be more extensively interviewed.

Then, the committee, which

includes Quinn, Police Chief James Harding, services board member Wendy Roberts, and Reg Ellis, a private consultant, will select a final candidate who will still have to be approved by the board. Quinn predicts the process will be completed by mid-October.
