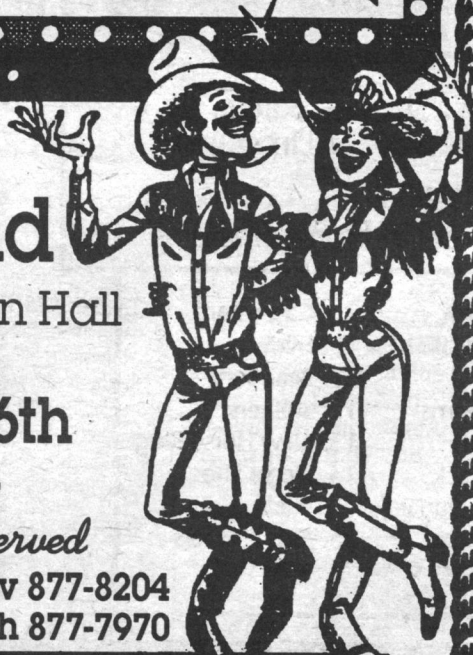

Seat belt campaign underway

From now through Sunday, police officers across the province have joined for a common purpose; the creating of a province-wide emphasis on seat belt enforcement.

The October campaign is the second phase of two province-wide campaigns targeting seatbelts, the first phase took place in April. To kick off the October campaign, the Halton Regional Police Service will join with other police agencies across Canada in Operation Impact.

Based on 1991 Ontario Road Safety Annual Report Statistics for drivers and passengers involved in fatal and personal injury collisions, unbelted drivers are 15 times more likely to be killed and five times more likely to be hospitalized than belted drivers. Unrestrained children are at risk too.

The most successful strategy to deal with the dual challenge of misuse and non-use is an aggressive combination of public awareness and education that complements the enforcement efforts.

Operation Impact is a national traffic law enforcement and awareness campaign targeted toward seatbelt compliance. Last year 171 police agencies participated in Operation Impact. This year the goal is to increase the number of agencies participating, thus imparting the message to greater numbers of the motoring public.

Over 3,400 fatalities resulted from motor vehicle collisions during 1992. Between 1986 and 1990 there was a 6.8 per cent reduction in traffic fatalities across Canada. Over a corresponding period, seat-belt use increased nationally from 63 per cent to 82 per cent. These figures may help to explain why Transport Canada claims that, by convincing the motoring public to wear seatbelts and properly secure their children, police officers conduct the single most effective countermeasure available to save lives in Canada.

Golf course theft

Thieves could not be bothered to open the cash register at the pro shop of the North Halton Golf and Country Club, so they took it with them.

Sometime Saturday overnight, suspects smashed the rear door of the shop, enabling the tumbler to be

unlocked, entered the store and made off with the register, its contents and three watches. Damage to the door and a smashed window, and value of the stolen goods amounted to \$9,000.

Police are investigating the incident.

Wallets lifted in Norval

Weekend thieves in Norval were attracted to wallets, cars and wallets in cars.

Sunday around 4 a.m., suspects stole a 1989 Jeep Cherokee from a driveway of a Guelph St. residence. The suspects moved on to Draper St., where they removed a screen from a porch door, reached inside the house and took a

wallet from a purse hanging on a nearby hook. A car parked at another Draper St. residence was broken into, and a wallet stolen. The wallet was recovered later that morning, but the contents were missing.

Halton Regional Police are continuing their investigation, and admit they have possible suspects.
