imely tips help when dealing with minor bulbs

Everyone is familiar with the larger bulbs - tulips and daffodils, but there is a wealth of smaller and lesser known bulbs that provide bloom from March (sometimes February) through to June, and a few that bloom in the fall.

The minor bulbs should be planted in masses as the small flowers get lost on their own, or in a rock garden where they can be enjoyed close up. They should be left alone after planting to spread naturally as they do not have to be replanted every few years like tulips.

As a rule, most minor bulbs like full sun. Exceptions are Muscari, Scilla and some tiny Narcissi which flourish in partial shade as well. Do not plant them too deep or they will not flower or even

grow sometimes. A general rule of thumb is a planting depth of three times the bulb diameter. This will range from 2-4 inches in most cases.

The following are only a few of my favorites in the minor bulb group. The earliest are the Galathus nivalis, snowdrops; Eranthis hyemalis, winter aconites; and the species crocuses. The snowdrops and aconites bloom at the first hint of spring, usually in March, but if you are lucky, occasionally in late February.

Amazingly, hardy bees will work the flowers as soon as they open, seemingly regardless of the weather. Fast on their heels comes the cheery yellow Crocus ancryrensis, silvery chrysanthus blue pearl, tomasinianus, purple

and white lady killer and cream beauty to mention a few.

Next are the Iris reticulata; these are tiny bulbous iris only 6" high, sweetly scented and come in lovely shades of blue and violet.

Scilla species range in size

from the 6" Scilla siberica to the 18" Scilla campanulata (Spanish bluebells) now classified as

Hyacinthoides hispanica because of their resemblance to hyacinths.

Both Spanish bluebells and the famed English bluebells (Scilla nutans) combine well with hostas, bulbs providing early color and later foliage of the hostas cover the dying bulb foliage. A recent muscari is Muscari tubergianum. They are sky blue on top of the flower spike, navy blue beneath and each bloom is rimmed with a fine, white line.

well. One of my favorite plant groups is the Fritillaria family. They bloom in April/May. The most

Both grow in partial shade as

familiar are the crown imperial fritillarias and the smaller checkered fritillarias (Fritillaria meleagris). However, more varieties are available each year. New this year is Fritillaria pallidiflora with large chartreuse (yellow with a hint of green) bells and blue-green foliage. It grows 12" tall in rich soil and partial shade. Fritillaria camschatensis and persica Adiyaman have deep purple bells, a wonderful contrast with white


