

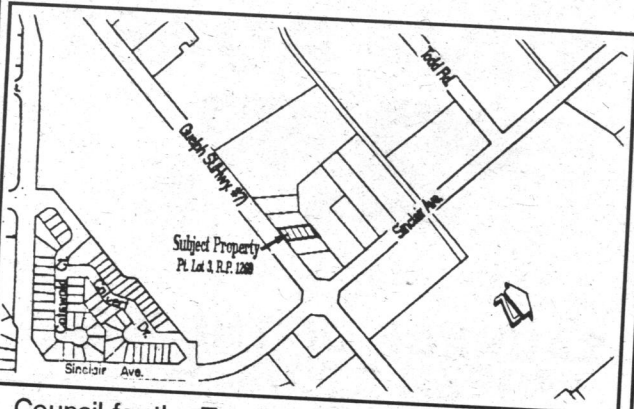

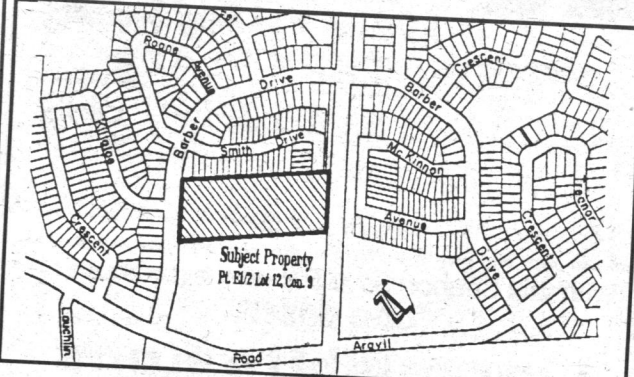

Police Beat Kindergarten ransacked

Late Friday night, culprits smashed the Kindergarten room window of George Kennedy Public School on Weber Dr. in Georgetown, entered the room and set fire to the ceiling tiles and lost and found box. They spilled paint on the floor of a storage area, and removed a computer printer and monitor, which was later found in the hallway of another part of the school. Damage was estimated at \$1,000. Police believe the culprits were youths, but have no suspects.

Welcome sign vandalized

Culprits spilled black paint on the Main St. "Welcome to Acton" sign early Monday morning. The extent of damage has not been determined and police have no suspects.

Neat thieves

More than \$1,000 worth of tools were stolen from a pick-up truck, parked Thursday overnight in the driveway of a 17 Side Road residence. The tools were located in the back part of the truck which was shielded by a Velcro cover. The cover was replaced once the tools were removed. A mitre saw, speed drill, hammer drill and jig saw were seized, but other tools were left behind.

Reckless robbers

Police believe culprits used a credit card or like instrument Friday late afternoon to slip the lock on the rear door of a Hwy. 7 Acton residence. The alarm was activated, but thieves still ransacked the master bedroom. Nothing was stolen and no damage was caused.

Break and enter

Culprits entered a Fourth Line residence in Georgetown Thursday through an unlocked rear door and stole a stereo console. Police believe the theft was carried out by two people because of the size of the console. There were no witnesses or suspects.

Questions swirl at tax meeting

Further groundwork was set for proposed tax reform in Halton Region at a meeting Friday between provincial ministers of municipal affairs, finance and education and regional and municipal representatives and representatives of both school boards.

The province must agree to the property tax reform by Nov. 15, and legislation must be put in place to accommodate the new system for it to go into effect.

Halton Region is proposing to adopt regional market value assessment (MVA) by 1996 based on 1992 property values. In the meantime, regional and educational taxes will be divided between the four municipalities based on their individual 1992 property values.

At a Sept. 30 special council meeting, Burlington regional councillors stated they would not support the tax reform system if the province did not give its approval by Nov. 15. This would have resulted in a regional MVA based on volatile 1988 property values, the financial repercussions of which would harm many people and businesses.

Halton Regional chairman Peter Pomeroy said two questions arose at the meeting - one concerned which piece of legislation should be modified and another concerned timing. Regional staff indicated modification of the Region of Halton Act would allow for the adoption of the new

tax system, but provincial officials were not convinced. According to Pomeroy, a private member's bill was suggested by the ministers as the most likely possibility.

"We don't care what they have to do to allow for the new MVA - as long as they do it," Pomeroy said. He further suggested provincial officials should "quit complaining about the lack of money and time, and do something."

Timing was also a point of contention, with provincial representatives suggesting the 1996 year of implementation be moved back to allow for higher priority issues. "We explained to them 1996 had to be the year of implementation and they seemed understanding," Pomeroy said.

In general, Pomeroy was "pretty satisfied" with the outcome of the meeting.

Town of Halton Hills mayor Russ Miller's sentiments were more assured. "It was a very positive meeting," Miller said. "We were very well received and the ministers said they would provide us with an answer by the 15th."
