## Joint job creating emphasized

### Queen's Park Report

A couple of weeks ago I talked about the devastating effects of federal policies upon our province. I'm pleased that Premier Bob Rae has urged the new federal government to create jobs and reverse the decade-long discrimination against Ontario — a call that could lead to real results for Halton North. He has invited the federal government to join Ontario in creating jobs, repairing and building infrastructure, renewing manufacturing, and investing in people and technology.

Jobs, justice and hope — the things our government has been fighting for from the start — are what all governments must be about these days.

While Ontario is hoping the federal government will follow Ontario's lead in investing in jobs, the

provincial government is already investing, on its own, almost \$4 billion a year in putting people back to work, and a further \$3 billion on training and higher education. An additional contribution from the federal government will mean more jobs and activity in Ontario. Every bit counts. I will continue to work with our local communities, including municipal and federal representatives, to ensure that creating jobs and putting Ontario back to work is the number one priority.

The federal government must look beyond its promise for a \$1 billion country-wide infrastructure program. The federal government must also turn its

attention to providing an adequate federal training program so that workers get trained and unemployed workers get retrained, to improving the federal tax system, to working on a way to provide and pay for public services, and to developing a national innovation policy that invests in research and development in industry and in universities.

The new federal government should show its commitment to Ontario and Ontarians by reversing the previous government's discrimination against Ontario. Last week the Premier released a set of studies the government commissioned to document how Ontario has been affected by the practices and policies of the previous federal government. The studies were conducted by Informatrica, one of Canada's leading economic analysis firms.

Informatrica found that in 1991, at the height of the recession, the amount by which federal taxes paid by Ontarians exceeded federal government spending in Ontario was \$15 billion. The studies also show that over the past decade, the federal government has been shifting its debt onto Ontario taxpayers.

Informatrica studies are staggering. They are a solid, empirical documentation of what Ontarians clearly felt in their hearts as they went to the polls.

I'm looking forward to a new era of federal-provincial cooperation focused on jobs and renewing the economy. Ontarians need jobs, and they want governments to work together to do all they can. In addition to our own job creation program — the largest, most ambitious program in all of North America — we are ready to participate in programs that help put people back to work and that invest in our province and the communities of Halton North.
