Long-term care addressed

Halton Hills will no longer have last place provincial standing in longterm health care.

At Thursday's Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital board of directors meeting, board members approved the development of a 57-bed long-term care facility at the hospital.

Currently, Halton Hills has 69 long-term care beds per 1,000 population over 75. The provincial average

is approximately 150 beds, while the regional average is 112.

The hospital's plan will require the relocation of the 36-bed Chronic Care Unit from the upper floor to the main floor of the Bennett Centre.

According to information distributed at Thursday's meeting, the decision of the hospital board is a preparatory step for the expected doubling of Halton Hills residents over the age of 75, from 992 in 1992 to 1834 by the year 2001.
