Director Chris Columbus (Home Alone) creates with "Mrs. Doubtfire" a perfect showcase for the considerable talents of Robin Williams. Williams offers up heaping servings of his comedic talents in the form of fast-paced one-liners and bawdy comedy schtick.

Mixed in with the comedy is a suitable amount of drama surrounding the issue of divorce and it's effects on both fathers and children alike. Often the sentiment is overly simple and heavyhanded, but along comes Williams, over vigilant, to put the film back on its humorous main course.

brother responsible for William's transformation from macho man to many woman:

The film does suffer from lack of spacing, particularly during the dramatic moments and at 120 minutes may be too long to sustain the interest of some small children.

However, the success of "Mrs. Doubtfire" is solely because of the talents of Williams. He holds the film together both comedically and dramatically, cooking up a great-tasting, low calorie treat perfect for the holidays.

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
