October - Reed paints Halton-Peel Liberal red

In something of an upset, Julian Reed, a former provincial Liberal member of the Legislature, defeated incumbent Progressive Conservative Member of Parliament Garth Turner also the National Revenue Minister - in the Oct. 25 federal election.

Reed got the nod from 22,512 Halton-Peel voters (37.1 per cent), while the defeated Turner managed

18,321 votes, 30.4 percent of pate such a large Liberal those who cast ballots.

Dick MacDuffee, the Reform Party candidate, finished a relatively close third, managing 16,826 per cent, or 27.9 per cent of the popular vote.

While expressing pleasure at his own victory at the polls, Reed was amazed at the national results, which saw only two PC candidates get elected. "I didn't anticisweep," he said.

The Reform Party's strong showing locally surprised a lot of people, but not lifelong resident John Cummins

The reason? His son John Jr., who was born in Georgetown, was elected as the Reform Party Member of Parliament for the federal riding of Delta in British Columbia.

The younger Cummins, 51 attended the old Chapel St. Public school in Georgetown and is a Georgetown District High School graduate. He attained his BA from the University of western Ontario in London and has his MA from the University of British Columbia. As a youth growing up in Georgetown, John Jr. earned money during the summer working on area farms and in his later teens, worked at Domtar in Georgetown.

It was rather ironic that the Reform surge in Halton-Peel was reflected in the election of a former Georgetown resident in Delta, British Columbia.

Traffic lights okayed

After 11 accidents in three years, traffic lights will be installed at the intersection of Steeles Ave. and Ninth Line in Halton Hills. Regional staff insists the project was not influenced by the accident numbers. At the Oct. 13 Halton Regional Planning and Public Works Committee meeting, councillor accepted the tender of Guild Electric Limited of Scarborough for the installation of traffic signals, illumination, pavement markings and traffic controllers at the intersection. Although the intersection is within the boundaries of Halton Hills, it is under regional jurisdiction.
