## Flurry of accidents Snow flurries on New Year's Day resulted in a flurry of



Heritage Halton Hills intends to table recommendations and public comment to the Town Council of Halton in 1994, followed by an Ontario Municipal Board Hearing and enactment of a Designation By-Law.

Harrison Public School in Georgetown will have an excursion for their kindergarten students to the Police Safety Village, located on the grounds of Halton Region's administrative offices outside Oakville, this Friday.
