by Parent Aid include parents' legal responsibility, teens leaving home, sexual relationships, substance abuse, peer pressure, motivation and self-esteem.



The long wait is over and the new Eramosa Community Library opens its doors on Saturday, June 20.

From humble beginnings in April of 1974, the Eramosa Community Library was housed in Rockwood Centennial School until 1991. The school, with overcrowding problems, desperately needed the space, and so the library moved to a temporary location in the old Emporium building until their own structure could be completed.

Moving the library's collection of some 15,000 books will be no mean feat, and the library board has already lined up many patrons to assist with the move, which is scheduled from June 15 to 19.

At the hub of the activity is Linda Hornick, the librarian. She has been instrumental in applying for and receiving grants for the library. In order to qualify for grants, library activities must be varied and increased, so Linda looks forward to seeing new programs implemented this fall.

Most of the summer will be spent getting the library organised, so that by fall, the regular children's programs and preschool story time will be in place. Linda is also hoping to form a youth group, or young adult committee, through which members could help her to select material TUESDAY, JUNE 9, 1992

for their age group.

Another exciting project which is planned for the fall is a video cooperative venture. Libraries within the Southern Ontario Library Service area rotate videos. The public will have access to some great classics, such as National Geographic specials, as well as wonderful children's films.

The 50-50 draw, worth \$14, was won by Carol Norton.


Two new members were recently installed: Marilyn Russiani and Margaret Stinson. Welcome to Acton Branch 197!


Vowsin April Drysdale - Collins
