## Mayor defends smokers' rights

will be at least 13,000 deaths from diseases associated with tobacco use. Tobacco will kill five times more people than will die from AIDS, suicide and motor vehicle accidents," Wllmott explained.

"The federal statistics suggest in excess of 500,000 Canadians will die in the 1990s from tobacco use related diseases, and I think you have to stop and listen to the numbers."

Halton Hills does have a municipal bylaw than bans smoking in Town-owned buildings and vehicles but it does not cover bingo halls, theatres, food stores or restaurants.

General Committee members were told some restaurants in Acton and Georgetown already offer diners a non-smoking section.

Acton councillor Gerald Rennie, a non-smoker, pinpointed a key issue when he asked: "What does a public place mean? You can't call a retail store a public place when it's privately owned and run." Rennie was told that none of the existing Halton smoking bylaws define public place and that issue has to be looked at.

Halton Hills mayor Russ Miller, a smoker, questioned how the smoking bylaw would be enforced and whether restaurants offering no-smoking areas would be exempt.

"Ithink that smokers have rights too, and so what we have to do is try and put in measures that will make public spaces environmentally safe for smokers and non-smokers. We need a bylaw that is restrictive but not to the detriment of everybody that likes to have a cigarette," Miller said.

"I'm talking about the restaurants and bars, the business people who are finding it very hard in today's society to keep people coming. If they have restrictions that eliminate certain segments of the population, it could put them out of business," Miller said.

With Council's approval, expected next Monday, a two-phase program will begin to investigate a proposed bylaw. Phase I is a public consultation process designed to obtain input from all segments of the local community.

Phase II would look at the results of the process and could result in a local bylaw to control smoking in public places.

Council will have a final report on the issue in October.
