need to be more aware of drug usage by seniors. We've had seminars for seniors with doctors and pharmacists, but more work is needed."

Bonnie Ewart, Halton's commissioner of social services, said last week she had no first-hand knowledge of any seniors at risk in Acton but admits she does hear cases where seniors are overmedicated. Ewart said she supports the Province's proposed long-term care reform plans.

"The Province is trying to coordinate existing seniors' services and put in place new programs

that existing ones aren't addressing because they have rigid, specific mandates. Where some of the criticism of the government's plans has come from is the administrative and bureaucratic structures that have been proposed. I think they should work around existing community structures and not try to super-impose new ones, which was the government's original intent."

The provincial government has called for the establishment of 40 service coordination agencies to be backed up with 14 long-term care area offices across the prov-

Acton Super Sub agent Nick Anagnostopoulos voluntarily withdrew his hot dog cart from Prospect Park last week when a complaint drew the Town to realize it had conflicting legislation on the issue of allowing refreshment vehicles on Town land.

"We enhance the park," Anagnostopoulos explained to Council last night (Monday). "We follow all Town guidelines concerning location, litter and pricing. We are a local business em-



Suspects used a hatchet to open a safe and steal \$400. Following an investigation, two young offenders, one 12-years-old, the other 13, were both charged with three counts of break and enter.
