Meeting tomorrow should be big step toward town's growth to 10,000

Continued from Page 1 longer-term solutions."

Mohammed also predicted that once Halton Hills Council decides how much growth is wanted and where, there will be major fights.

"Right now there are a lot of development applications for Acton and there's a really limited amount of growth available. The developers will be competing."

Regional Councillor Rick Bonnette says he is not concerned by Mohammed's caution. "It's staff job to be cautious on bringing forth major reports or any expense so that doesn't surprise me. As far as the big pipe coming up you're not going to convince me to bring the pipe up from the lake for Acton to grow.

"First of all, you're not going to convince a lot of Acton people to drink Lake Ontario water. Secondly, if we can get an extra 1,500 people in the next few years would it really make sense to bring the big pipe up just to grow by an extra

1,500 or 2,000? I don't think so; I would take a lot of convincing. I think the planner is warning us to support plans for the big pipe to solve all of Halton's water problems."

To accommodate the increased growth Halton has asked the Province to allow it to take more water than now permitted from Fairy Lake.

Studies done this past summer have indicated that drawing enough water to accommodate the proposed growth and maintaining enough for fire emergencies would likely impact the lake.

Halton planner Rick Robertshaw says Halton is confident the Ministry will approve its proposal to take more water.

"We're asking the Ministry of Environment for an increased capacity allocation in the permit to take water. What that would provide for is additional water to be taken from the Prospect Park well. Currently we have a permit that

provides for a half-million gallons a day that can be taken. But of that half-million only 250,000 gallons is for regular daily use. The rest is held as an emergency reserve," Robertshaw explained."

"We want the permit amended so the full 500,000 gallons can be used for daily consumption to provide existing residents and the proposed new ones with daily water. To do that we would have to build some new, stand-by wells and have some additional stand-by power in case there's a hydro failure."

At tomorrow's (Wednesday) Regional Council meeting politicians are expected to direct Chairman Peter Pomeroy to convey to the Ministry of Environment the Region's request for "expeditious approval" of the increased permit to take water from the Prospect Park well and for the Ministry's co-operation in finding a solution to providing water to accommodate the expected growth to 10,000 population in Acton.

When her husband didn't come back into the bar, the woman went out and found him bleeding and bruised, with two other men. She was pushed to the ground by one of the suspects. The couple could not give police a description of their attackers.


