"The Acton house league is kids who want to have fun and like to win. We get a mix of kids with different levels of skill. They all have one thing in common, they want to be Wayne Gretzky," Bowen laughs.

League hockey in Acton is noncontact with seven divisions, Tyke through Juvenile. Bowen says if you can skate, you can play.

"We don't want to have to keep picking the real young kids up off the ice, but we did have two players that we pushed out to get them to the face-offs. We like the young kids to come out and we'd like to have more girls play. We had an exhibition game with two girls teams and maybe that sparked some interest."

Registration for this season begins Thursday from 7-9 pm at the Acton arena. Registration contin-

ues Saturday morning from 9-12 noon. The cost is \$110 per player or \$250 per family.

"That fee covers the cost of sweaters and socks, a banquet, is adding a second Bantam team trophies, medallions and team photos," Bowen explains. "Each team will play a regular season of 20 games and everyone gets in the playoffs."

This year, the Acton league is affiliated with Milton, so players will travel there once a month.

Bowen is expecting 250 Acton

and area kids to register this season. He is hoping for a lot of Bantam players, those aged 14 and 15. "This year the rep league and I hope that doesn't hurt us.'

As Bowen prepares for this week's registration he is also out getting new sponsors. "Our sponsors make our season a success by helping to pay for equipment and tournaments. Some like, the Legion, Lions and Goy Cartage, have been helping us for 25 years. I

hope to get more sponsors and I want to see more parents coming out to practices and games. This year the Hockey Moms will hold bingos every other Monday night to help raise money."

Players need standard CSA approved hockey equipment including a neck protector and full-face or visor helmet.

Anyone with used equipment can price it and bring it to the registration Thursday for sale on Saturday.
