Bonnette wants report

Angry Acton Councillor Rick Bonnette has demanded that Town staff take another look at his request to end an inequity in the municipal bylaws that unfairly costs Acton residents money.

Two weeks ago Bonnette asked staff to report on bringing Acton's building permit bylaw into conformity with Georgetown. Currently the Georgetown bylaw requires a 25-foot setback from the road but Acton's requires a 35-foot setback and in some cases it costs Acton residents \$250 to fight the more stringent bylaw if they want to build a backyard porch or deck.

Staff reported that it would be expensive to bring the bylaw in line with Georgetown's and suggested the issue be put on hold until a report on bringing all laws into conformity was before Council.

Bonnette was not impressed with that answer. "It is a cop-out to say wait for the overall conformity report. Acton residents are getting shafted by a costly quirk in the bylaw and I'm not going to stand by and accept that answer. I thought I was firm that I wanted to see a wrong righted," Bonnette argued.

Mayor Russ Miller supported Bonnette's call for immediate action on the issue, reminding Councillors who keep saying they want Georgetown and Acton to be one town that the setback bylaw was the place to start.

Grant elimination fails

A second attempt by several Georgetown councillors to cut all grants from the 1993 Town budget failed Monday at Council. The councillors suggested that no grant money be awarded as a cost-saving measure in a tight budget year. Acton Councillor Gerald Rennie made a heart-felt plea for Council not to cut or freeze grants. "The implications of this would be farreaching. We would be sending a message to Halton Hills that Council has no interest in culture, that
