Knox Presbyterian Church celebrated its 147th anniversary Sunday in a day filled with remembrance of the past and hope for the future.

Guest minister, Rev. Wayne Maddock, chaplain at Sunnybrook Medicare Centre, gave an uplifting sermon, and the congregation enchoir.

Rev. Craig Criber gave a tribute

to those pioneers who made the church possible and expressed hope for the younger generation to continue their dedication to the church.

Acton resident Mac Sprowl is related to the very first pioneers of Knox Presbyterian Church. Mr. Sprowl's grandfather, Robert Sprowl, aided building the first Presbyterian church by drawing was Rev. John McLachland in joyed the beautiful sounds of the stones from neighbouring farms for the foundation of the church.

The need for a Presbyterian

church in Acton grew out of the local Sabbath school that was attended by 16 children during winter. Locals like Robert Sprowl began drawing the foundation for the new Presbyterian church in 1845.

Mr. W.C. Burns inaugurated the church with its first sermon in 1847, but the first minister to be called 1851.

In 1894, 126 members contributed toward the building of the second Presbyterian church. The church underwent several renovations, such as: a new roof, an extension on the back of the church, and a new kitchen, but is now at its peak condition.

After the celebration ceremony, the congregation gathered in the fellowship hall for refreshments and anniversary cake. Old friends greeted each other while new acquaintances were made.

The 147th anniversary celebration will continue this week with an Anniversary Beef Dinner on Wednesday night.
