

Lawsuits threatened at Council meeting

There were threats of lawsuits, bitter recriminations and a call for a resignation during a wild Council meeting Monday night.

Before it was over, Counc. Rob Heaton threatened to sue the Town for muzzling him, Counc. Pam Johnston threatened to sue anyone who spread false rumours about her, Counc. Rick Bonnette was told he should resign and Mayor Russ Miller threatened three times to end the meeting if a noisy crowd of ratepayers didn't settle down.

The meeting began with rural Counc. Heaton reading a prepared statement and demanding a public apology for what he termed "slanderous allegations" against him.

Heaton wants Council to withdraw a confidential memo, leaked to The Tanner, that describes his treatment of Town staff as "abusive, frustrating" and "workplace harrassment" and recommends that all communications with Heaton be restricted to department heads only.

Budgets OK'd

For the second straight year rural Acton residents, and other Ward 2 homeowners, face a zero per cent property tax increase for Town purposes.

Monday night Council approved both the operating and capital budgets after some last minute cuts and additions.

An urban Acton homeowner with an average assessment of \$5,700 will pay \$624 in Town taxes this year. That's \$7.59 more, or a 1.25 per cent increase.

Rural Acton residents, who do not have garbage pickup, streetlights or crossing guards, will pay the same as last year, \$448.
