Hitting 50 has almost become an obsession for Robin, who will make donation number 49 at the Red Cross Blood donor clinic on Thursday, March 25 at the Acton Legion.

"My father, who made over 100 donations, used to give blood regularly," Robin said in an interview Thursday.

"He's 87 and although he can't give blood any more, he always helps out at the clinic near his home in Toronto.

"The only time my father tried to cheat, in his whole life, was to try to fudge his age on his blood donor card so he could donate blood longer," Elliott laughed.

After accompanying his mother to blood donor clinics most of his life, son Matthew, 19, is now following in the family tradition and vows he will beat his mother's donations, no problem.

## Education wage concessions?

Halton Board of Education teachers and staff, including approximately 142 in Acton, have until March Break to decide if they will voluntarily give up one day's pay.

If they don't, board administration will begin to lay off 75 employees in an effort to save \$1 million dollars in this year's \$294.8 million budget,

Trustees have told staff to make \$2.4 million in cuts to bring the mill rate increase down to four per cent. One and a half million dollars can be saved by making cuts in budgets for supply teachers, lunch room supervisors and supconcessions.

Although initially suggested as

a mandatory move, participation in the proposed wage concession plan for the board's 5,000 teachers and staff was made voluntary after a provincial union, the Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation, interceded in the issue and refused to re-open existing contracts to allow the concession.

Also, lawyers for the teacher groups and the board said that for teachers to make a charitable donation of their one day's pay to the board for tax purposes, each individual employee will have to sign a contribution form.

Acton Trustee and board vicechair Dave Whiting said the \$1 plies and the balance from the million is coming out of the budget, and how it comes out is up to the

"If half the staff give us the one day's pay then we only have to lay off half the 75 people," Whiting said last Wednesday.

"It looks like we have about 75 per cent of the staff in support of the concession. It's a positive gesture in tough times. I'm going to jump on the bandwagon and kick in whatever the average donation is," Whiting said.

The average donation is expected to be \$200. That is one 200th of the average salary of \$40,000.

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
