# Great grads

Nine out of 10 Halton high school students go to college or university, a recent Halton Board of Education study shows.

Almost all of the grads, 96 per cent, attend classes in Ontario, with 53 per cent in university, 35 per cent in college and four per cent in apprenticeship programs.

Area educators will use the report to plan courses that will help meet future work force demands.

The study showed that 27 per cent of graduates take arts programs, and the second choice is business, marketing, accounting and secretarial training.

The study showed that Halton had a 5.5 per cent drop-out rate last year, compared to a provincial rate between 23 and 30 per cent.







## It's bicycle season in Acton!

Here in Acton, it is spring-time, and that means it is time to get that bicycle out, pump up the tires, oil the chain and tighten the brakes — then enjoy the season.

The bicycle season can be enjoyed by all, if the safety rules and the rules of the road are followed. Parents, it is up to you to set the example; remember, under the Highway Traffic Act, a bicycle is a vehicle and is subject to the same rules of the road as an automobile.

For example, a bicycle must stop at a stop sign or a red light, and must be ridden on the right side of the road. Riding with two passengers on a bicycle is an offence, as is attaching oneself to a vehicle.

All these rules of the road are subject to a penalty of \$90, or a juvenile court appearance. The Town of Halton Hills has also enacted by-laws which affect the operation of bicycles. By-law

84-1, Part 11, Section 4 states that "no person shall drive a bicycle along any sidewalk."

Next week I'll talk about all the bylaws that govern the operation of a bicycle in Acton. Until then, safe pedalling!


